TUNNEL FROM DOVER TO CALAIS—  
and the idea of a tunnel under the British  
sea, will, if carried out, eclipse all former  
undertakings of the kind. The **Portland**  
and Company's plan, first formed in 1872;  
and in 1874, when Mr. John Hawkshaw,  
F.R.S., Mr. Burnell's  
Garnett being appointed engineers,  
it finally decided upon places the  
one in line extending from a spot be-  
Folkestone and Dover, through the  
Gravel Chalk to a point between Sand-  
gate and Chislev, on the opposite coast of  
France. The length will be thirty one miles  
two miles will be under the strait. Shafts  
will be sunk on each shore to the depth of  
of our harbor and fifty feet below the  
low water mark; and driftways from the bot-  
toms, for the draining of the tunnel,  
to begin two hundred feet above the  
seas. These driftways will be driven  
at each end on a down gradient of one  
inch to the hundred of the drainage  
of the strait; and then an up-grade of one  
inch to the hundred and forty to the  
end of the strait. The crown of the tun-  
nel will not be less than one hundred  
feet below the bed of the Dover  
strait. It is hoped that the excavation  
smoothly through chalk, in which com-  
paratively rapid progress will be made.  
It is estimated that the probable cost of  
this gigantic task will be about four millions

to double this estimate, in anticipat-  
ing border obstacles which may arise.


