Sarah Bernhardt, with admirable presence of mind, opened the case containing the jewellery she had just worn, and flung the glittering toys among the people. A scramble immediately ensued, and the actress and her companion, taking advantage of the lull, rushed into the hotel, the doors of which were at once closed. It was not a moment too soon, as, while Mdlle. Bernhardt lay fainting in the hall, the mob endeavored to effect an entrance, shouting "Out with the Jewess! She has given us false diamonds. Out with her, or we shall smash everything!" The actress who had quickly recovered from her swoon, laughed gaily, exclaiming "Do these people think that I am going to cast pearls before swine?" Quiet was not restored until past midnight, and a number of arrests were made. 


