The entrance to the Grand Canon is one mile above Canon City. A narrow mountain spur extends down nearly to the river, abruptly terminating in a granite promotory the face of which, toward the valley, is a MILLINERY-Latest Novelties up this is the mouth of Grape Creek, and directly opposite the track of the Westeliffe Division of the Denver and Rio Grande rails.

In this culminating grandeur of the Royal Gorge the traveller instinctively holds his breath, and the most garrulous are holds his breath, and the most garrulous are awed into reverent silence, as in the immediate presence of the omnipotent power that rent the mountains asunder. Words of description are weak and comparsions are futile to express the incomparable. Let the Eastern reader imagine Mount Washington cleft in twain by an earthquake, and a railway running through the chasm; or the Southern reader, Lookout Mountain broken apart, and cars following the course of the jagged fissure; or let him who has looked down from Bunker Hill monument imagine himself looking up to cliffs, or down from precipices, ten times as high. 


