Town Marshal LETTER FROM A RAMBLING CORRES. PONDENT AT SACKVILLE.

In Professor Sheldon's report of his visit to this country, he made special mention of the value of the marsh lands in Sackville, for pasture, and the production year after year of good crops of hay, without the use of any artificial fertilizers. The Tantarmar Marsh, which I understand is the largest, as there is more than one tract of marsh land in the vicinity, stretches out like a great sea of grass for miles with nothing to relieve the eye; not even a friendly tree under which the fine looking cattle may take umbrage in the heat of the day. Few barns are to be seen, as the bulk of the hay is stacked up on the spot. At first sight one might think that it cost nothing to produce such fine crops of hay. True, there is not that annual outlay that the farmers of the upland districts have to make to secure good crops, but on examination and enquiry it will be found that it requires time and labor to produce what is termed "English Hay," which is like our timothy and clover; the marsh land in its primitive state yields "broad leaf" or wild grass only, which is readdies out, and the timothy and red clover gradually and naturally (without any seeding) takes its place. Then there is the process of making or elevating the land which is done by allowing the water to cover the land at high tide and being "locked in," it is allowed to settle; the result "locked in," it is allowed to settle; the result is that a deposit of ½ to ½ inch of soil is added; when the tide is ebbing the water is let run off again. In this way lakes are converted into marsh land, by the use of a canal or large ditch, the lake being first drained. With splendid pastures, and an abundance of hay, it is not to be wondered at that this district is noted for producing good beef; but every country has its producing good beef; but every country has its disadvantages, and in this case it exhibits itself in that the uplands are not nearly as productive as Carleton County. Well, then, if by its na-tural advantages these marsh lands are adapted
