It is of course essential that great care should be used in the selection of subjects for debate. They should not be too heavy on the one hand nor too frivolous on the other. These elements may be all in sympathy and yet from the very nature of things lack in appreciation. VERY much has been written and very much more said on the theme how to make our Lodge meetings attractive. We are no sure that all this writing and speaking has done very much good, practically. There is only one grand difficulty in the way as re gards the general application of any theory. Very many of our Lodges are located in rural districts where material is scorce and resources meagre. In such localities members have per force to put up with such means as are available, and the character of the rooms in which they meet and the associations with which they have to surround themselves are not such as are calculated to give tone and zest to the meetings. Then they have to rely almost entirely upon the zeal and principle of the members, which elements ton Apply to are of course absolutely essential to success under any circumstances, but which may be greatly assisted in their operation by suitable surroundings. But we may not be astray in Bank of Nova Scotia. saying that in the country there is perhaps, as a rule, rather more of a sturdy consistency with principle than in the cities and towns, and that hence people in the former are no so much influenced, do not so much require the aid of, by extraneous conditions.

Referring therefore to town and city Lodges, we think perhaps more care should be exercised and more expense would be prudent in making the Lodge rooms and their appointments more attractive, more comfortable. If regard is had in this respect to it will not be those members alone who are already the subjects of such tastes and habits who will be pleased, but the effect upon all will be at once gratifying, chastening, refining.
