

THE New York Free Trade Bull writes of the United States Tariff, as to at fects farmers :-

What is our tariff? Our tariff is a system of duties paid at our ustom houses in money on goods brought into the country from foreign countries.

1. One object is to raise money to carry on our government. This is a good object. 2. The second object is to keep out of our country certain foreign goods, so as to induce men to make them in this country. Let us see in what way this object is attained, and whether the result is good or bad for the American farmer.
