Late Telegraphic news from Great Britian and Ireland :-

LONDON, May 12.—The Provincial papers publish rumors that Vernon Harcourt, Home Secretary, has reved letters from Fenians threatening his life. Mr. Palmer, who acts as a volunteer detective in several important cases, in a communication to the St James Gazette, says he has reason to know that the arrest of the as-eassins would be facilitated if the Government will guarantee not to surrender the in-former in the event of his being claimed by

the Russian or Ge man police.

A man supposed to be an American was arrested at Balfast of terday, on suspicion of being concerned in the murders in Dublin.

He has been remanded for a week. His name is Forrest Walker.

BELFAST, May 12.—Joseph Corkin has been arrested here. It is believed he was the driver of the car which took the murderers to Phoenix Park. London May, 12.—A suspicious looking canister was found at the Mansion House, last night, suspended by a brass hook to the railing in front of the building. Attached

to it was a lighted fuse, which was extinguished by the police. The box is said to be full of powder, of which it smells strongly. The police around the Mansion House and other city buildings have been doubled. Many reserve policemen have been called out for extra duty.

DUBLIN, May 14 .- The car drivers of this city held a mass meeting to-day and pledged themselves to discover the murderers of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke. London, May 14.—Right Rev. Jas. Chadwick, Roman Catholic bishop of Hexam and Newcastle, is dead.

LONDON, May 15 .- Earl and Countess Spencer attended divine service at the Chapel Royal, Dublin, on Sunday. They were escorted thither by a detachment of dragoons and cordially received by the public. NOTES ON THE DUBLIN ASSASS-INATION.

The Manchester Guardian says that the crime is traceable to the Fenian party, recruited mainly from America, who again interfered when they saw that conciliation was probable. It says that there is a desperate and malignant conspiracy limited to a small number of persons. WORK OF A SECRET SCCIETY.

LONDON, May 9 .- It is believed that the murder was instigated by a secret society determined to strike at the root of the Eoglish executive in Ireland. The opinion prevails that the crime was the work of the American Irish. The only clue to the murderers is the description given to the park keeper, who saw four men drive out of the park just after the murder. They are said to be American in appearance. The Freeman's Journal says:
"Lord Frederick Cavendish was dogged from the time be landed until he reached the spot where the assassins closed in and killed him.

The meaning of the assassination is nihilistic,
Fenian and anti-English, not agrarian."—

The sympathy for the Cavendish family is
everywhere apparent, mourning being worn
by the Government efficials and others.— Lady Frederick Cavendish is in a terrible state of grief. The Prince and Princess of Wales and Mrs. Gladstone called on her this morning. She afterwards left for Chats-

There was a prospect that the reconcilia-tion between the Gladstone Government and the Land Leaguers would be complete, and soon would be followed by measures tending more and more to the independence of Ireland. Now the danger is that a resistless cry will be raised in England for stern and despotis measures of representation and the state of th despotic measures of repression as the only means of securing life and property in the neighboring island. It may have been the aim of implacable fanatics to prevent a restoration of harmony by the terrible and startling deed of Saturday evening.—Phila-

delphia Record (Ind.) The Rev. Henry Ward Beecher preached on Sabbath night on the Irish assassinations. He made these points:—If this blood that has been shed unites Parnell and Gladstone, and if Gladstone is sustained by the Liberal party, then it is the blood of reconciliation; but if not, and Gladstone goes down, then God help Ireland and Britain too.

The following cable message from Right Rev. John Walsh, Roman Catholic Bishop of London, Ont., has been transmitted to Mr.

To Right Hon. WILLIAM E. GLADSTONE, Premier, London, England:
In the name of the Catholic Bishops of Ontario, Canada, I express our abhorrence of the assassination of the Secretary and Under Secretary for Ireland as unchristian and un-Irish, our sympathy with their afflicted families and our hope that the righteous cause of Ireland may not suffer by the atrocious crime.






