EXHAUSTED LAND .- There are, says a writer, various degrees and stages of exhausted or worn out lands. Some writers recommend clover as a reclaimer for exhausted lands; but a soil that will grow clover is by no means exhausted—at all events it is not the exhausted soil we shall allude to. What we shall refer to is old fields that have been turned out for years, and have grown up with briars, pine bushes, or sedge grass.—
