

WORMS AND BUGS -The Farm and Garden says in relation to the attacks of worms and bugs: To save all sorts of vines from the attacks of bugs and worms requires constant watchfulness and a timely use of remedies. There is no use trying to drive the yellow-striped cucumber bug off after it has injured half the plants in your patch. Prevent it coming on by changing the natural scent of the vines. Sprinkle your vines manure water. Either of the above, if applied dayly, will generally keep the bugs off. up every day from among your vines and killed. These bugs like to seek shelter under some chips, little pieces of boards, shingles, etc., which you may place among your vines, so you will know where to look for the pest,
