The Chaos in Egypt has not yet been reduced to order. The powers have not yet ret apparently got so far as to have finally appointed the means for such a happy consummation. The Conference has seemingly decided to request the Sultan to send a force to punish the rebels and restore the authority of the Khedive, but the general opinion is that the Sultan, anxious though he is to establish his sovereignity securely in Egypt is afraid of the safety of his European pro vinces, if he allows any part of his army out of reach, and so is opposed to sending any troops. In the event of his retusing it is de cided, according to latest reports, that the work will be entrusted to a joint English and French force. The English are apparently prepared to do it jointly or alone. The French are more inclined now than before the successful bombardment of Alexandria to take a part, but it would still be necessary to take a vote of the Chamber on the ques tion, which, whether it goes in favor of the preposal or not, will be embarrassing. The Italians, too, are inclined to be very jealous of the French, and, perhaps, some difficuly in this connection would arise. In the meantime, Ezypt is not doing much to help her self. The nominal authority of the Khedive is once more established, but he has no force apparently that he can trust, and he is dependent upon the British for the restoration of order in Alexandria. The British land force is a small one, and, with Arabi and a strong force threatening the city, the task does not proceed very rapidly.
