COLORADO LETTER.


DENVER, Colo., March 3, 1882. EDITOR SENTINEL, -A great many people think that Denver isn't much of a place, atter all. Well, it isn't. There are only 60, 000 people living within its corporation lines, and miles of stately residences and pretty cottages stretching away in the distance .-But, when taking a bird's eye view of the city, it is so large that the laborers' houses in the suburbs seem but toys, and even the smoking Argo works, two miles from the city, are but a good sized steamboat in comparison. Edgings, But admitting the size of our city, people say that we have no advantage, no schools or churches that can compare with those of Eastern cities of similar size. To prove the fallacy of this is the object of this letter. There are more children to the square rod in Denver than any other city in the United States, consequently there are large and handsome school buildings in every part of the city, containing from five to ten departments in each. All are well managed and are under the charge of the best of teachers. Besides these are the Brinker Institute, the Denver University, Wolfe Hall, Jarvis Hall, St. Mary's Academy and the Colorado Business College, in any of which a thorough education can be acquired.

As for our churches, the streets are dotted with them all over the city. Suffice it to say that one large and beautiful structure is built of stone so valuable in mineral deposits that it essays \$8 per ton in gold and silver. So much for the building itself, As for the spiritual advantages to be enjoyed, Denver is like all other cities in the West, very wicked indeed, but affords a splendid field for

Another evidence that we have all the advantages of the East is the fact that Denver is to have an Exposition. No city has quite reached the ultimatum of clery until she can number an expositson among the things of her past. Denver has now passed within the charmed circle of these cities, and will hereafter hold up her head with all the dignity such an event will warrant. The exposition will open August 1, this coming summer, and will be for the exhibition of ores, mining and manufacturing machinery. In all large cities real estate which is any-

where near the business centre is sold at very high figures, too high, by far, to enable the laboring classes to purchase homes. This has been the case with Denver, and but few of the employes of mills, foundries and factories own their homes. But through the agency of the Denver Circle Real Estate Company, lots have been laid out in the suburbs near the horse-car and Herdic lines, and are being sold on installments, which amount to less than what they are now paying monthly for rent, and thousands of poor men are taking advantage of it. Their simple homes are a pleasant sight, and the low houses, grass plots and tiny gardens in the rear are the best proof we could ask of Denver's pros-


