Although it has been officially and publicly
stated that no secret convention has been concluded between the English Government and
the Sublime Ottoman Porte with reference to the Sublime Ottoman Porte with reference to the future of Egypt, we have excellent auth-ority for asserting that the Sultan has agreed to sell, and Mr. Gladstone has agreed to buy, the suzerainty of Egypt in consideration of the payment of £6,000,000 sterling, this being the capitalization at ten years' purchase of the annual tribute payable by the Khedive to the Porte. Mr. Gladstone will now, in all probability, find it convenient to forget his criticism of Lord Beaconsfield for purchasing the Suez Canal shares. He will doubtless hope, by making the sovereign of England the suzerain of Egypt, to cause the British nation (and, above all, the British electors) to forget the circumstances which, under his auspices, culminated in the suzerainty of the Transvaal. The public announcement of this unlooked-for settlement of the Egyptian question may be postponed till the meeting of Parliament; but the Cabinet has arrived at
