A TERRIBLE DEATH .- HELD UNDER AN ENGINE TO AWAIT CERTAIN DEATH.—A rail-road accident on the South Pacific Coast Line last night was the cause of two deaths, one of which was as terrible as any recorded. The through freight train from Sauta Cruz, which arrived at Park street, Alameda, at 8 o'clock, was crossing a barren marshy land east of a tresitle bridge that crosses what is known as San Leandro Bay, and when at a point about half a mile from the bridge the engine sunk and keeled over, drawing after it six cars.
As the train was taavelling at a rapid rate of


