Four shots were fired at the efficers, one fatally wounding Cox. Eastwood pursued the man who fired the revolver and shot him in the head, arm and hand. The man is not expected to recover. He was among a group of ten men, or whom attempted to hurry the murderer away, but was captured by a soldier of the Rifle Brigade, who drew his bayonet and threatened to run him if he did not surrender. Cox was shot in the base of the skull and must have died instantly. He was 30 years old and his assailant, whose name is Christopher Dolan, is about the same






