[New York Tribune ] The battle of Tel-el-Kebir seems to have been well planned and most gallantly fought. The intrenchments were carried at the point of the bayonet, the troops reserving their fire until they were close at hand and then charging with a precipitate rush which proved irristible. It was quick work and thorough. The reputation of the British soldier stands higher to-day for this splendid exhibition of valor and intrepidity. There was no flinching anywhere along the line. The Irish re-giment shared with the Highland brigade and the English Guards the honors of the engagement. It is an achievement of which the Nation has reason to be proud. It will etrengthen the position of the Liberal Government. It will carry a thrill of relief to Mr. Gladstone's anxious heart.

[New York Sun ] After all deductions on the score of Egyptian poltroonery are made from the honor won by the English in this engagement, the fact remains that the capture in a night assault of a line of thworks some five miles in length, defended by a force which, both in point of numbers and weight of metal, was nearly twice as great as the attacking body, reflects high credit on the commander who planned and on the men who executed the movement. It was indisputably a brilllant feat of arms. About the fighting qualities of the British soldier no doubt indeed has ever been entertained in any quarter, but in Egypt, as in other campaigns, the difficulty has been to provide him with food to fight upon. It will be the fault of the transport service if the victory at Tel-el-Kebir is only turned to imperfect account by a compulsory halt for supplies on the part of the troops ordered to push on to Zagazig and thence to Cairo. [Boston Advertiser.]

Sir Garnet Wolseley's march upon Tel el-Kebir and Cairo is but an incident of this vast policy, and resembles the removal of a rock by the engineer who builds a railway. The rock is Arabi, not necessarily or demonstrably a bad character fit only for exile, but an offence to legitimacy and a hindrance to sound progress. Arabi has rights; but England and the Khedive have superior rights. end of which may be taken for granted. 
