The Order of Odd Fellows is of ancient date; it was established by the Roman soldiers in camp after the order of the Israelites, during the reign of Nero, the Roman Emperor, who commenced his reign A. D. 54, at which time they were called the "Fellow Citizens." The name of Odd Fellows was given to this order (A. D. 79) by Titus Flavius, Emperor of Rome, from their singularity of notions, and from their knowing each other by night as well as by day, and for their fidelity to him and their country. He only gave them the name of Odd Fellows but as a pledge of friendship; presented with a dispensation engraved on the Arch of Titus, the Emperor of the Roman Empire, the Golden Candlestick, the Golden Table (weighing one great talent) the sun for N. G., the moon for V. G., a lamp for secretary, the lion for guardian, and the eagle for the emblem of mortality for the G. M. It is very probable that the first account we have of the Order spreading into other countries is in the fifth century, when it was established in the Spanish Dominions under the Roman dispensation; and in the sixth century by King Henry in Portugal; and in the twelfth century it was established in France, and afterwards in England by D. Neville, attended by five knights from France, who formed a Lodge of Honor in London, which Order remained until the reign of Geo. III, when a part of them began to form themselves into a Union, and a portion of them remain until to-day; on this account, the lodges which remain, are very numerous throughout the world, call themselves Loyal Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, being a portion of the original body - *Domus Odd Fellows*.

A CLYDE LITTLE GARDEN - Certain natives of Nova Scotia and other parts of Her Britannic Majesty's American possessions have strayed from their native land and made homes for themselves in this city. They retain a fondness, however, for the potatoes and other products of the land of their birth, and a considerable part of the cargoes of coasting schooners from the Province is made up of barrels of potatoes, sent from friends at home. Such merchandise has until recently been inspected and passed upon by the customs officers on the wharves. Recently, however, it has been ordered that such merchandise shall be sent to the appraiser's office to be examined in the usual way, and in numerous instances, tubs of butter have been found neatly packed in barrels of potatoes. This is not in accordance with Uncle Sam's method of doing business, and the consequence is that there is a surplus of butter as well as of potatoes at the appraiser's office, while sundry Nova Scotia residents of this city have failed to receive their home supply of those articles from home. - *Boston Herald*.

THE SCOTT ACT LEAGUE - Since the late election to repeal the operation of the Scott Act in this city, the supporters of the Act have been at work organizing for a crusade against the illegal sale, and for a more vigorous and effective enforcement of the law in its entirety. After discussing pretty thoroughly every plan proposed, it has been decided to form a distinctive organization, to be known as the "Scott Act League," whose sole object shall be to secure the vigorous enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act in this city and vicinity. A meeting is to be held on Friday evening at which the officers and working committee will be elected. - *Fredericton Capital*.
