To the Wardens and other members of the Church, in the parish of Richmond:
My DEAR FRIENDS:—I must confess to being somewhat surprised, as well as deeply gratified, at the cordial and complimentary address with which you have presented me. Although quite conscious of the imperfections that have attended my work among you, I accept your kind words as the genuine expression of your feelings and opinions, and know that you have, in your kindness, overlooked much in me and my methods that might have been otherwise.
If I have been happy enough to win the esteem of my brethren of other religious bodies, and I have received many kindnesses from them, it has never been by my unflinching faithfulness to the principles of the Church of England, nor by endeavoring to appear to them what I was not.
