HOUSE OF COMMONS.
March 1, 1882.
It is claimed that the remarkable prosperity of the country under the National Policy is still further shown by the fact that during the past year of incorporation were issued 100,000 shares of stock of the Canadian Joint Stock Company. At 1877, 20 companies with an aggregate capital of \$6,650,000, besides supplementary letters patent to 3 companies with a capital of \$222,000, or in all 32 companies with a total capital of \$6,872,000; not to mention the new enterprises incorporated by act of Parliament, which at least double the number and capital.
Sir John Macdonald obtained unanimous leave of the House to introduce a bill to repeal the Stamp Duties after the fifth day of March instant. All unpaid stamps may be redeemed until 30th June next, or changed for postage stamps. Sir John remarked that stamp duties were an easy way of raising revenue. There was no reason why commercial men should not contribute to revenue on commercial transactions, as well as farmers, mechanics, manufacturers and workmen like himself, but Canada was so prosperous, happy and contented that the Government had been enabled to take off many burdens. In fact, they had gone as far as they could without affecting the principle of protection to Canadian industries. The Government had made a principle in any way to interfere with any duties that would in the slightest lessen protection. The bill was immediately read a second and third time, and became law as far as the House of Commons is concerned.
In reply to Macdonnell (Laurier) Carson said the Government intended to form brigades this year and drill 25,000.
Hon. Mr. Blake, in moving for statement of the number of persons, counted in the census though absent from the place in which they were counted, challenged the reliability of the census.
Hon. Mr. Pope defended the mode of taking the census, whereby the number of persons in the census though absent from the place in which they were counted, had been omitted and created great injustice between the Maritime Provinces.
Mr. Donville, in moving for correspondence relating to making the winter port of Canada in the Maritime Provinces, warmly repudiated the idea that the Government would do so great an injustice to the persons named as to allow them to be cast off from the benefits of the North West Commerce in the Navy, as had recently been stated the Sydney contemplated doing.
Hon. Mr. McKenzie made an important motion, the object being to secure for preservation in one volume copies of charters and constitutions granted by the Crown or Imperial Parliament in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, New Brunswick, &c., and all despatches relating to the early constitutional history of the country.
Sir John fully coincided with Mr. McKenzie's object, and would lend all the aid in his power.
March 2nd.
The bill for the repeal of the stamp duties, amended by the Senate by providing that parties who purchased stamps at five per cent. discount shall only be returned the amount that was paid, was returned to the House and read a second time.
Mr. McCarthy's bill to constitute a court of railway commissioners was read a second time and referred to a select committee.
In public session committee Mr. Charles Burpee moved for copies of all correspondence or papers concerning the purchase of land for a site for the Woodstock N. B. post office from J. Corkery and E. M. Boyer; the name of the party or agent who made the purchase; the date of the warrant ordered for payment of the same, and the date when paid to J. Corkery or E. M. Boyer.
The announcement of the attempt to shoot the Queen was made in both Houses and created a profound sensation.
March 3rd.
Sir Albert J. Smith has arrived at the capital.
The Governor-General to day assented to the bill abolishing the duty on bills of exchange and promissory notes, and the cost for relief of Bank of P. E. I.
Some matters were introduced or advanced and progress made in the Budget details.
The speaker read an address sent down from the Senate.
On motion of Sir John, seconded by Mr. Mackenzie, who was acting as leader of the Opposition in the absence of Mr. Blake, the House was taken into consideration. It is as follows:—
To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty:—
Most Gracious Sovereign: We Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Senate and Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, desire most earnestly, in our own name and on behalf of the people whom we represent, to renew the expression of our unwavering loyalty and devotion to Your Majesty's person and government. We were profoundly shocked, may it please Your Majesty, by the intelligence which was received by telegraph, yesterday, that an attempt had been made on Your Majesty's most honored and valuable life. We take the earliest opportunity of adding our congratulations to those which we are persuaded, will come from our fellow subjects in all parts of your Empire, at your providential escape from so grave a peril. We are deeply grateful to the author of all good for averting a dire calamity from Your Majesty's people, and thankful to him that Your Majesty's life may still be counted among the precious possessions of your devoted subjects. We pray that the blessings of Your Majesty's reign may long be continued.
