HOUSE OF COMMONS.

March 1, 1882. It is claimed that the remarkable prosperity of the country under the National Policy is still further shown by the fact that during the past year charters of incorporation were issued up "Canada Joint Stock Companies' A., 1877," to 29 companies with an aggregate capital of \$6,650,000, besides supplementary letters patent to 3 companies with a capital of \$822,000, or in all 32 companies with a total capital of \$7,472,000; not to mention the new enterprises' incorporated by act of Parliament, which at least

double the number and capital.

Sir John Macdonald obtained unanimous leave of the House to introduce a bill to repeal the act imposing Stamp Duties after the fifth day of March instant. All unused stamps may be redeemed until 30th June next, or changed for postage stamps. Sir John remarked that stamp duties were an easy way of raising revenue. There was no reason why commercial men should not contribute to revenue on commercial transactions, as well as farmers, mechanics, manufacturers and workingmen like himself, but Canada was so prosperous, happy and contented that the Government had been enabled to take off many burdens. In fact, they had gone as far as they could go without affecting the principle of protection to Canadian industries.

The Government had made it a principle not in any way to interfere with any duties that would in the slightest lessen protection. The bill was immediately read a second and third time, and became law as far as the House of

Commons is concerned. In reply to MadDonnell (Lanark) Caron said the Government intended to form brigade camps this year and drill 25,000.

Hon. Mr. Blake, in moving for statement of the number of persons, counted in the census though absent from the place in which they were counted, challenged the reliability




