## QUEEN VICTORIA SHOT AT!

About 7 P. M. Thursday, the following news reached us, through the kindness of the Telegraph Operator here—

London, Mar. 2nd, 1882.

Queen Victoria was shot at, on the Windsor Railway, this afternoon, at 6.30, but was not injured.

## LEGISLATIVE CORRESPONDENCE.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 25, 1882.

DEAR SENTINEL.—Intimations are due to the effect that the session will be short. Private business and resolutions are being urged forward with all possible haste, and the prospect of business being accelerated by the Government. Of course this far, necessarily, the business preparatory and the notice paper is being filled.

Notices of enquiry or motion have been given as follows: Why the former Sheriff of Gloucester and Queen's were not re-appointed?

By Gillespie, whether the Government contemplate any change in the educational department, &c., or the diminishing expense of the school system.

By Kinney, notice of Resolution that vacant seats in the Legislative Council should not be filled till after the next general election.

By Hon. Mr. Fraser, bill to amend statutes of Probate Courts.

By White, (Carleton) for details of travelling expenses of members of Executive.

By Gillespie, for details of assets and liabilities of the Province at time of meeting of the Legislature.

By White, (Carleton) by what authority were the members of this Assembly paid \$6 to buy stationery at last session; also if any person or persons other than the clerks and members have been supplied with stationery from the clerk's table during the present session. Also is the Ball a current or page of the House. If so, what is the character of his work and how long has he been employed?

Was the money paid for at last session in full for all services, and if not, what amount is still due?

By Barbier, bill to amend School Act so that school assessment on property shall be paid in school district in which property is situated.

By Blair, respecting intention of Government to vacate in Legislative Council. Blair gave notice of the following resolution for Saturday—

Resolved, That Mr. Blair, a member of this Legislature, having stated in place that he is credibly informed and believes that he can establish by evidence that the whole amount of fees collected in the office of the Clerk of the Peace in the Supreme Court during several years past has not been accounted for by the Government:

Therefore Resolved, That a committee of five members be appointed to enquire into all the facts and circumstances connected with the matter in question and into the amount of collections of fees made in the said office, and into the purposes for which the moneys not accounted for have been applied; with power to the committee to send for persons and papers and examine witnesses on oath, and report the evidence taken before such committee and the minutes of the proceedings thereon.

By Sayre, bill to give Kent, Carleton and Gloucester each one more representative.

While the abstract principle of Mr. Sayre's bill must be admitted to be just, still the popular feeling is that justice when meted to certain Counties must be done by reducing the total number of representatives and not an increase.

By Sayre, a comprehensive series of enquiries respecting the disposal of hemlock bark lands by Government.

Your Mr. White is to ask for details of cost of public printing, a question that may give ventilation of the policy of having all the public printing done by contract.

Your readers will thus see that at an early stage of the session foundation is laid for very comprehensive and important discussion.

FREDERICTON Feb. 27, 1882.

Mr. White today introduced a bill to amend sec. 32, cap. 58, const. stat. of highways in Carleton Co.

Prov. Sec said no charges had been preferred against the late Sheriff of Queen's John Palmer, nor against Mr. Vail, late Sheriff of Gloucester. He also stated that Government intended to introduce a bill relating to schools, but do not contemplate any changes in the management of the educational department or the Board of Education—also that Government do not intend to make any alterations in the law relating to timber land.

Mr. Palmer's motion for an official report was lost. The session will be shortened in consequence.

Dr. Vail's motion for correspondence with Dominion Government respecting Extension Extension claims, seconded by Blair, elicited a debate, several Hon. members expressing surprise that this long standing matter had not yet been settled.

Hon. Mr. Fraser said that in 1859 the Dominion Government were called upon to pay the claim, and negotiations were had with the International Contract Company, by which the latter were satisfied in full and agreed that the Province would have to have a claim against the Dominion Government. When the arrangement was made in 1859 the Government of New Brunswick had no option in the matter but insisted that they had a right to be repaid for the \$120,000 that had gone into the roads from the Provincial treasury. He (Fraser) was not aware of any claim being put in or contemplated by the International Contract Company (ex Clark & Co.) since the time of the arrangement in 1859. An order in Council directing a resolution was passed in 1870 or 1880 and a gentleman was sent from Ottawa to revalue the road. That gentleman came down and made a report which was under the consideration of Dominion Government when he (Fraser) was in Ottawa in January. The Government expected to have a decided answer from the Dominion Government soon and might have further information to lay before the House shortly.

In reply to Mr. Willis, Hon. Mr. Adams said that the Government, believing that 80 cents per acre for our lumber lands was less than their value, brought certain portions of the public lands to sale with a view of ascertaining their value and bona fide applications were made to carry out that object, and which lands were brought to sale and sold to bona fide purchasers for prices at an average of \$1.54 per acre.

2. At a sale, the Department, having been informed that a combination had been formed between purchasers, before the sale to prevent the establishment of an increase in the upst price, authorized reasonable bids to be made for the Government.

3. The Government did not hold any pretended sale.


In reply to Mr. Elder, Hon. Mr. Wedderburn said it was the intention of the Government to hold an exhibition in St. John in 1883. The attention of the Minister for Agriculture had been called to the inadvisability of the Dominion Government co-operating, but as yet no formal reply had been received.

Mr. Blair, in moving the resolution for a committee of enquiry into the disposition of receipts from the Clerk of the Peace, showed that these receipts had been growing less and less; he claimed that they had not been properly accounted for, and that as a result of the enquiry it would be shown that the accounts furnished to the House from time to time were not to be relied upon, and the lack of hypocrisy would be torn from the face of the Government.

Mr. Wedderburn warmly repudiated the charges of Blair, and proposed to move a verbal amendment to the resolution which was accepted by Blair, and the resolution passed.

## SORIRE.

IMPORTANT DECISION.—Yesterday our Frederick correspondent telegraphed as follows:—The Supreme Court has just rendered judgment in the case of *perit*, Hackett, in which the right of *coroner* to review convictions under the Canada Temperance Act was involved. The court decided that the writ was taken away, thus making the judgment final. This is an important victory for the Scott Act party, as there will now be no delay in enforcing convictions. Judge Hackett was taken away, Judge Wilmore, the chief justice and Judge Wilmore, Duff and King held that it was taken away in all cases where the Magistrate had jurisdiction, unless the application was made by the prosecution, when it was not interfered with.
