The following is a synopsis of the bill read before the Town Council and forwarded to the Legislature for enactment :- The

WATER WORKS BILL contains 9 sections, embracing the following

Section 1-Authorizes the Town Council to construct such ystem os water works as it may deem advisable, for protection against fire and sanitary, domestic and other purposes; with power to appoint the necessary officers; define their duties, and provide for their remuner-

Section 2-Authorizes the entering upon any land within or without the limits of the Town, for the purpose of making surveys, observations, plans, &c., for obtaining infor-formation as to the best systems of works or

Section 3 - Authorizes the Council to take, hold and convey into the Town the water of any river, lake, &c., in said Town, or within a distance of ten miles therefrom. Also to take and hold, by purchase or otherwise, any of land necessary for laying pipes for conducting or discharging water; also to take and hold land around margin of lake out of which the water may be taken, not exceeding four rods in width, and on and around the streams and ponds so far as may be necessary for the pre-servation and purity of the water from the

Section 4-Authorizes the Council for the purpose of constructing said works, to enter upon any lands within or without the said Town, and erect and maintain such dams, reservoirs and buildings as may be necessary; make and establish such public hydrants as may from time to time be deemed proper; distribute the water through the town; lay down pipes to any house or building for coa-720 00 ducting water thereto or carrying off the waste water; regulate the use of said water and establish the prices or rents to be paid therefore; may carry any pipes under or about any highway or other way, but not to obstruct travel; enter upon and dig up any road or street for the purpose of laying down

pipes, &c. Section 5—Makes the neccessary provision for the payment by the Town of damages sustained by any person by the taking of their land, water or water rights, or by the construction of works. In case the Council and person claiming damage cannot agree, upon application of the claimant to the Judge of the County Court of Carleton, three dis-1,500 00 interested freeholders of the County shall be appointed to assess the damages; application

must be made within one year. Section 6-For the purpose of paying the expense incurred in purchase of lands, water, water rights, and the construction of necessary works, the Council is empowered to issue Debentures, with coupons attached, for such amount, and payable at such times, and bearing such interest as Council may deter-

Section 7-Empowers the Council to call in and pay any or all of said debentures before maturity, by giving three months notice of their intention thereof. Section 8-The net income accruing from the use of the water shall be applied towards paying the said debentures and interest.

The Council is authorized to make an annual assessment to pay any deficiency in the interest and such part of the principal of said debentures as may be deemed advisable. Section 9-Before proceeding with the erection of such works, the Council shall have plane, specifications and estimates made of system proposed; publish such information as will give the ratepayers a knowledge of the system proposed and the estimated cost; the question of constructing said works shall be 800 00 submitted to a vote of the ratepayers, and if those voting in favour of the system are a 2,000 00 larger number and assessed in a greater 2,000 00 amount of property than those voting against it, the Council shall proceed with their con-Total estimated expenditure, \$238,092 57 struction; the Council proceeding to con-In connection with this I send you the struct shall be taken as presumptive evidence that the vote required by this section was
