THE Chignecto Post remarks :-The recent terrible accident on the I C R., naturally creates distrust as to the protection afforded under present regulations for running trains. Any locomotive is liable to give out and delay a train between stations, and when delayed it is exposed—notwith-standing all possible guards and provisions for safety—to the same dangers and risks by which the collision on Friday occurred and three lives sacrificed. What is the remedy? In England, where nearly all railways have double tracks and where all trains on a track go the same section, it has been found ne cessary to introduce the block system, the leading feature of which is that no train shall leave a station until the train in advance has left next station. If the block system is es-sential to safety on a double track, it is doubly so on a single track, where trains travel in both directions and where collisions at either end are possible. On certain railways on the Continent, stations are connected by electric bells automatically worked to signal the arrival and departure of trains, which in conne on with the block system reduces the rick of collision to an absolute nullist. lity. The cause of the late accident is laid by different parties to rum, to the snow storm and to the carelessness of the train hands. We believe some system ought to be adopted whereby the safety of trains is assured beyond such contingencies as storms, the negligence or incompetency of hands. The single track on the I. C. R., its enormous traffic and the vast number of trains continually traversing its length, ought to induce the very best system of train management.

This is a timely article, and the suggestions are worthy of due consideration. When one considers the immense volume of transit by railway and that it is, under the most perfeet system of equipment, beset with risks of a grave character, the importance of providing every possible eafeguard that experience and science suggests must be manifest.

Says a contemporary :-The return of long winter evenings should remind our young men and boys of the fine opportunity which they afford for intellectual improvement. The record of some of the ablest men that Canada and New England have produced proves that the chief part of their education was obtained during the hours of liberty from manual labor enjoyed during our long winters. Rightly employed, the forced leisure of the season should make Canadians the most intelligent people in the world. The stern severity of a much more rigorous climate, acting on an earnest and energetic race, long since made the Icelanders famed over Europe as a highly educated peo-ple. William Cobbett, the English economist, political writer and member of Parliament, who published a most excellent grammar of the English language, mentions in his works that his knowledge of grammar was nearly all acquired when a common soldier in New Brunswick, and when his only light for studying purposes was what he could get by taking his turn before the barrack fire. Knowledge and intelligence never commanded better rewards, or could bring their possessor more pleasure, than at the present day.
