

mos-.22 THE RED MAN IN CANADA. - Canada seems o be far in advance of the United States in ber efforts to civilize the Indians within her borders. The latest scheme in this country, after millions of dollars have been expended, is to virtually make a citizen of the red man. The Dominion Government appears to have succeeded much better than we have with a similar plan. The result is that now the ribes of Canada are all becoming interested in agriculture and very flattering reports are given of the results they are achieving as farmers. Canada is probably spending much more money than the United States in this direction. Last year Fala-Government asks for an increase of \$256,-232, or a total of \$909 308. This large of the far North West need food; but this, probably, will not long be the case. Al-

though the total Indian population of the Dominion is estimated at 107,722, according to recent returns made to the Government there are only 46,962 resident upon reserves. 90.443 bushels; peas, 26.794 bushels; barley, 28,454 bushels; rye, 2102 bushels; buck-Ayrshire Rose, and White Pigeon. wheat, 5826 bushels; potatoes, 163,423 bushels: hav, 13 673 tons. The revenue from th-ir fisheries for the year is placed at \$127-200; from the sale of furs, \$175,087, and First Quality White Lead; the other industries \$386,860. 




