**South Richmond Items.**  
Dec. 28, 1881.  
The Review of the Presbyterian Sabbath School at McKinnon, South Richmond, on the evening of Christmas, was a most pleasing occasion. The Kirk was comfortably filled, the school being well represented. The faithful Superintendent, Mr. J. L. Lavery, conducted the review of the lessons for the first three quarters of the year, and Mr. S. J. Parsons that of the last quarter. The questions were answered promptly and correctly; the Golden Texts were repeated, and a question from the Shorter Catechism for each lesson. The pupils showed, in their answer, a very general knowledge of the work of the whole year. At the close of the Review, the Secretary, Mr. Henry Hay, read his report, showing the number enrolled, officers and teachers, 99; average attendance, for first quarter, 93; second quarter, 90; third quarter, 65; fourth quarter, 45. The school was open 40 Sabbaths; two, all but one; several all but two. The collections had been sufficient to meet all expenses and leave a balance sufficient to procure quarters for the coming six months, besides the fact that the school had contributed over \$200 for missionary purposes during the year.

Mr. W. W. Hay, now addressing the meeting, and presented, according to his promise made at last anniversary, a handsome book to each of the three pupils who had attended most regularly during the year, viz:—Maggie Dickson, present every day, and Janet Hunter and Maggie Hunter, present on all but one day.

The school was then addressed by its former Superintendent, Mr. John Campbell, now a student of Theology at Knox College, Toronto, and by the pastor, Rev. R. McKay. Mr. S. J. Parsons stated that at the next anniversary of the school he would give a book to the pupil who would commit to memory the whole of the Gospel by Mark. The exercises were relieved by the singing of appropriate hymns; Miss Mary Neal presiding at the organ.

On Tuesday afternoon the school at Kirkland, of which Mr. David Kennedy is Superintendent, was reviewed, followed by refreshments and a Christmas Tree. Here, too, the scholars showed a thorough acquaintance with the lessons, and the whole proceedings were of the most interesting character.

The school at Oak Mountain, in charge of Mr. George Fleming, is shortly to be reviewed.

The above three schools have together contributed during 1881 \$122 to missionary purposes. The Presbyterians in the Oak Mountain section of Richmond have responded so liberally to the demand made upon them, that immediate steps may be taken towards building a comfortable and respectable church.

During the past summer the Presbyterians have finished the outside of a church, in the Houston section, some three miles from the village, on what is known as the Foxford road, and is the first church in connection with the Presbyterian body, erected in the State of Maine. Arrangements have been made to secure an assistant in giving support to the various churches in the Richmond and Houston district during the summer months.
