Fredericton, April 8, 1881.

DEAR SENTINEL,—Since my last the bill incorporating the Fredericton and St. Mary's Railway Co. passed. The 14th section that provides that if the bridge be built for foot and carriage traffic only, the company may dispose of the same to the Government, to be thereafter supported as part of the great road and bridge service of the Province, was withdrawn.

Hon. Mr. Adams sharply opposed it as a premium for informers and an insult to faithful officers. In the Legislative Council this bill was negatived, but on a reconsideration was carried with an amendment excluding it from operation in St. John. It is stated, however, that Mr. Adams is very indignant at the treatment he received from his colleagues in the Govern-

This Legislature this session had already passed a bill to authorize the purchase of a second engine. The conclusion of the citizens of the town was to have either one or the other, not both. The Town has now a debt of over \$65,000 of which \$6,000 was for the old engine. It was a serious matter to put a mortgage on your property and care should be taken about imposing additional taxation on this town which has only a population of about 2 400 inhabitants, and the taxes were high enough already. The water works are not needed for sanitary purposes, and with the bill authorizing the purchase of the second engine, he did not see the necessity of this bill. The Town is well provided for as regards fire purposes and he objected to further taxation being put on it. He had amendments which he would move to the bill. The first provides that the Town Council should not appoint as commissioners members of their body, and the honorable gentleman moved this amendment to that section, that persons so appointed should not be members of the Town Council.


