Though the distant thunder clouds bave cleared off, and the blue sky is seen again over-arching Europe, there are politicians and journals that will continue to forebode desperate every So far as this is horest prediction, the very cheapest kind of prophecy. The causes of war, like the poor, are always with us, and Europe presents a whole array of unsolved problems, each of which contains the germ of a conflict. It is not to be pretended, for example, that the Berlin Treaty did more than adjourn the Eastern question, which could be rendered "burning" again by any one of the Great Powers. Bos-

nia and the Balkan peninsula are magazines ot loose powder, needing but a spark to blow concord to the control winds Disturbances might arise at constantinople which would bring all the political to the "sick man's" bed again, eager to be "in at the death." The Russian Court could "let loose the degs of war" at any moment if it wished by the movement of a cavalry regiment, or even of a handful of armed slaves. On all sides may be seen quarrels half patched, or questions awaiting solution, which would serve to

start terrible contests; and the worst of all such provocations to war is the martial state; of Europe. The prodigious armaments in every country, which cost the tax payers of the continent more than \$500 000,000 per annum, and take from the ranks of industry yearly some will one of young and strong workmen are persiously expensive and tempting- The three or four great statesmen who control the vast forces of Europe must often hear the "whisper of Fate" suggesting a Sadowa or a Sedan, a fresh Austerlitz or a new Rais of Tilsit, and then-repose and general disarmament. There are no countries now where a government could move its countless battalions to war as Xerxes did, or Napoleon, with a single order of the day,' except it be Russia, and even there the late Czar rather tollowed his military than led them. Tois check-the necessity for enlisting national approval—exists, and also the enor-mous costline-s of modern war, both during the struggle and when the fine or indemnity has to be paid, which the example of the last

two great campaigns has tended to establish.
