Charles McKinley, Esq., fish warden at the Rapid de Fenne hatchery, has recently put into the Tobique waters 30,000 salmon fry. He has also placed a large quantity in the lower Basin, Grand Falls.

A letter from Rev. W. R. Pepper of 18th June announces his safe arrival in England.

Hon. John Costigan arrived in St. John last week, and proceeded to Grand Falls, from whence up the Tobique River.

Hon. Wm. Elder has been awarded the honorary degree of LL.D. conferred on him at the recent Ecclesiastical of the University of New Brunswick.

Mr. Wilnot has founded a three-year scholarship in the University, to be called the "A. A. Wilnot Numerical Scholarship," in memory of the interest taken by her late husband in the institution.

J. S. Harvey has with him forward to completion a large building on Connell street, west of McCormack's tannery, intended for a Furniture Factory. The location is a convenient one. Mr. Harvey will borrow his power from McCormack's tannery steam engine.

On the 1st inst. a fire and powder explosion occurred at Winnipeg, which did much damage to property and more or less seriously injured over a score of persons, some of whom have since died and others are not expected to recover.

This place has entered upon the fifth year of its existence, and shows good healthy progress. The present property has not been attained, however, without a struggle. Ten colonists by manly facing their difficulties, aided by the kind consideration of the late Government, now stand in a very encouraging condition. All the estimates, with a trifling exception, have made the necessary improvements in the lands within the required time of three years by which act they become permanent owners of their allotments. The present Government has a disposition to do even better than their predecessors, wishing to encourage our young men to settle on our own lands rather than go to people the North West.

The crops look exceedingly well here, as well as in the other settlements on the Tobique.

That ubiquitous pest the potato bug is as usual given. These destroyers are very numerous and give a great deal of trouble.

A comfortable school house has been erected in our settlement and we have school in operation. This institution has long been wanted, and we look for good results from the same. To the Trustees Messrs. Melvin, Hissell and Robertson, much of the credit is due for such a satisfactory educational provision.

Mr. John Hutchinson, one of our most industrious farmers, had the misfortune to lose a valuable mare last week, worth over \$200. It is a loss that he sustains with some inconvenience.

The trout season is full blown, and we are awaiting the promised visit of some of our Woodstock friends to try their luck in this line.
