HANGING OF O'DONNELL, CARRY'S MURDER ER .- A London despatch of the 17th says :-O'Donnell went to bed about 10 o'clock last night, and remained apparently asleep till 5.30 this morning. At six o'clock Father Flenny came to the prison and remained in prayer with him for some time. At the conclusion of the prayers the sacrament was administered to the condemned. O'Donnell then partook of a light mosity for the witnesses who appeared against

him, but that had now disappeared.

After communion had been administered to the condemned man, Binns, the hangman, entered the cell. O'Donnell submitted to the operation of pinioning with a smile and without a murmur. The procession then moved toward the scaffold. O'Donnell walked with great firmness, without the assistance of the wardens, who stood close around him. He was perfectly calm and self possessed While standing on the drop he looked around unconcernedly. The scaffold had the appearance of an ordinary shed; the "hempen loop," however, hung ominously from a cross beam above. The shed was boarded up so that O'Donnell and his attendants, as they stood there, could have been seen by those present only from the waist up. Binns lost not a moment in placing the cap over the victim's moment into the cellar-like pit which contained the convict's body and then turned away. Outstood.
