

AMERICAN NEWSPAPERS IN 1883.-From the new edition of Messrs. Geo. P. Rowell & Co's American Newspaper Directory, which

is now in press, it appears that the total number of newspapers and periodicals of all kinds issued in Canada is 596. There are no less than 74 daily papers, while the monthlies number 57. The weekly papers number 423. This is an excellent showing for the Dominion, though it cannot of course, equal the United States and Territories, in which the journals and periodicals of all kinds now reach the imposing total of 11,196. This is an increase of 585 in twelve months. Taking the States one by one, the newspaper growth in some is very considerable. The present total in New York State, for instance, is 1 .-399-a gain of 80 in the past year. 
