METHODIST CHURCH .- Montreal, Sept 24.-Rev. D. V. Lucas preached a sermon yesterday morning on Methodist Union. The growth of Methodism in Canada, as shown by Mr. Lucas, must be very gratifying to all who are connected with or interested in that branch of the Christian Church. The first Methodist Conference in Canada was held in 1824. At that time the total number of communicants was 7,263. The number is now 170,000, which is made up from the several uniting bodies as follows: Methodist Church of Canada, 130,000; Methodist Episcopal Church, 25,000; Primitive Methedist Church \$ 900, and Bible Christian, 7, 000. There are connected with the Sabbath Schools of the United Church, which is now known as "The Methodist Church," 175,000 children. According to the late Government census returns the growth of Methodism in Canada for the past ten years was twenty. seven per cent., while the highest percentage of growth of any other denomination was 17 per cent., several of the older denominations falling even considerably below the last named figure. The first Missionary Society of the denomination was formed in 1824. The amount of money fraised for the year was

\$144.08. The amount raised by the several bodies now united was \$193,000. The total value of church property is \$9, 130,000, besides \$450,000 invested in denominational universities, colleges and academies. On the temperance question the Methodist Church has always been foremost, though it is her joy to know that at this day others are equally desirous to drive this monster evil, the liquor traffic, from our fair land.

O'DONNELL'S TRIAL .- London, Sept! 28 .-O'Donnell, the murderer of Carey, was taken from Newgate prison this morning and brought before Magistrate Powers at Bow street Court, when his examination was resumed. The son of Carey was also cross examined. He stated that O'Donnell was sitting when he fired the first shot at his father. and that his father did not grapple with O'Donnell. He admitted that he might have testified, when under examination at Cape Town, that O'Donnell said to Mrs. Carey: "I had to do it, or I did do it." He said that he was not quite clear what the words SOME IMPRESSIONS used by O'Donnell really were. Mrs. Carey excited the special interest of spectators and several murmurs of sympathy were heard.— She recounted the incidents of the voyage, corroborating the other witnesses in regard to the circumstances of the murder, except that she swore that after her husband was shot she said to O'Donnell, " You shot my husband." O'Donneli replied, " Don't blame me, I was sent to do it," whereupon the woman who was with him said : "Don't mind,

O'Donnell you are no informer.' The cross-examination of Mrs. Carey failed to shake her testimony. She denied that she had talked to her son about his evidence. Magistrates Flowers asked O'Donnell if he had anything to say in answer to the charge of murdering Carey. O'Donnell replied: "Not at present." The prisoner was then ordered to stand committed for trial at the session of the central criminal court.
