Dublin, May 14.—Joe Bradey, convicted of participation in the Phoenix Park murders, was hanged at 8 o'clock this morning. Brady WE have now opened the LARGEST and was the first man hanged for connexion with

A vast concourse gathered outside of the prison yard in which Brady was executed. A strong force of cavalry, infantry and police were present to preserve order. There was no attempt at disturbance, however. Brady Black and Colored Cashmeres; rose at 6 o'clock. At 6.35 Canon Kennedy, of St. James Church, and Father O Reilly administered the sacrament to the condemned man in the prison chapel. The three remained praying together until the arrival of Marwood, the hangman. Brady submitted quietly Beiges, New Checks and Cashmere while his arms were being pinioned and walked slowly and unflichbingly to the scaff-old. The black flig indicating that the execution had taken place was hoisted over the prison at three minutes past eight. Almost immediately after the flag was raised a Gloves-Lisle, Taffeta and Lace; hearse and coach with mourners were seen at a distance coming in the direction of the prison. The police, however, interfered and prevented the vehicles from approaching.
There had been reports circulating that after the hanging his friends would endeavor to excite the people to a demonstration by parno statement." Brady smiled and replied,
"Don't be foolish; do you think I am a
fool." It is stated his mother threatened to disown her son if he gave the government ment any information.

By the condemnation of Kelly last week Woodstock, May 10, 1883. the trials of the seven assessins were completed. One of them, Joseph Hanlon, was accepted by the Crown as an informer. A second, Patrick Delaney, received sentence of death from his own confession, but in his case the doom has been commuted to imprisonment, probably for life. Brady was hanged to-day. The other four, Timothy Kelly, Michael Fagan, Daniel Curley and Thomas Caffrey lie under sentence of death. The executions begun to day will end twenty-six days later with the hanging of Kelly on the second Saturday in June. Thus, by the chances of the law, the sad procession is to be opened by one and closed by the other of the two knife men who did the actual killing in Phoenix Park. Beyond question the law will be allowed to take its course with Kelly Hungarian Patent Flour. and Curley, and in all probability with Fagan also. But in Caffrey's case a commutation of the sentence to imprisonment for life is considered likely. Only one of the men tried as principals for the murder, Fitzharris, the cab driver, escaped conviction, and he did not belong to the party marshalled by Curley for the assassination of Mr. Burke.




