At 9 o'clock preci ory, a great detonation was heard, followed by a crash of glasfalling from thousands of windows. A deliberate attempt had been made to blow up part of the Government officer, occupied by Sir

Charles Dilke and the Local Government Board, in the immense building bounded by Parliament street, Downing street, Charles street and St. James Park. The walls are of great thickness and of solid masonry and the windows protected by massive store balustrades. Opposite, 20 yards away, is the King street police station; 50 yards away a sentry guards the Parliament street front. Celery, Charles etreet is dark and unfrequented at night, which partly explains the fact that no lives were lost. Dynamite was placed on the window sill, inside the balustrade, where the fure, when burning, would be concealed from the view of any one passing. The force of the explosion was terrific. A great stone balustrade was obliterated, marsive masonry rent in fragments and the pavement shattered Henderson's Early and ground to powder. A wooden structure opposite was blown into splinters, and a mass of stone was driven through the wall of a house beyond it. Of the inside offices there remains nothing but splintered wood, broken a Large Stock of plaster, walls burst asunder, and an indescribable scene of destruction. The street is completely covered with fragments of plate glass, blown bodily out and shattered to atoms. The doors of the King street police station were burst in by the blast of air, and the detachment of men present were prostrated. Broken timbers and masses of stone were sent flying into King street. People crossing at Parliament street were knocked down. A hansom and horse were flung across the sidewalk against the front of the White hall Club, in which great plate glass windows were driven into the rooms. Everywhere the greatest emsternation prevailed. The people poured out of their bouses, broken

glass cracking under their feet. In the House of Commons the alarm was general; many members left immediately; the lobby was emptied and the people rushed out of Westminister Hall. Some two hundred police and a detachment of the fire brigade took possession of Charles street and drew a cordon around the building, which no one but the members of Parliament and public officials were allowed to pass. As the alarm spread, thousands flocked from all parts toward Westminister and the most intense excitement prevailed, a report rapidly gaining currency that the House of Commons had been blown up. No one pretends to explain the motive or purpose of the act. It is ascribed to Irish Invincibles as a matter of course, and is described as a part of a Fenian plot of threat and warning to the Government. One thing only is certain; it was a deed of frightful recklesspositive proof that the remedy imitated is of the positive pr ness and atrocity, and only inexplicable good highest value.
