THE CROPS OF THE DOMINION.—The Toponto Globe a few days ago published its an
nual reports of the state of the crops in diffefent parts of the country. From these it
would appear that the heavy and continuous

damaging effect on most of the crops. Fall
wheat, the most important of the cereals, falls
22 per cent. below the average; barley and
oats promise about the same yield, and rye is
only a little better, being 7 per cent. below
the average; potatoes will fall short of the
average by about 5 per cent.; corn by 26 per
cent.; while apples are very little more than
half a crop, and other fruit 20 per cent. lees
than the average. Hay alone promises to be
abundant. In some districts more than a
crop and a half is expected, and taking the crop and a half is expected, and taking the country all through the yield promises to be fully 22 per cent, above the average.—Ex.


THE MERCER CASE—The Mercer case, recently decided by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, is important, as settling a constitutional question, in which all the Provinces are interested. Andrew Mercer, of Toronto, die 1871, and for want of heirs the Ontario Tovernment claimed the right to his property by escheat. In 1879 Vice Chancellor Proudfoot decided that the right to the property was vested in the Local right to the property was vested in the Local Government. This decision was appealed from, but was confirmed by the Court of Appeals in Ontario, but the decision of the latter court was reversed by the Supreme Court of Canada, the Judges of which differed, but four were of opinion that the right of escheat vested in the Dominion, and only two that it was in the Provincial Government. An appeal was taken to the judicial committee of the Privy Council and judgment was delivered recently in favor of the Province of Ontario so that the law may now be considered. as settled and the right to the property of


