THE OWNERSHIP OF LAND .- The action of a certain American german from Balti-more in leasing an area d country of not less than 200,000 acres in northern Scotland for the purpose of forming a deer range, and in driving from this tract of land hundreds of families who were tenants of its landlords, has naturally produced considerable indignation among the large class of English people who are beginning to doubt the advisability of continuing the complete control that the owners of large estates have over the property. It is pointed at by the correspondents to London papers that if the American gentleman who has made this use of his wealth had attempted to do the same thing in this country, his lite and the lives of his agents would hardly have been worth a day's purchase. It is becoming more and more evident in England that the laws regulating ownership in land will have to undergo some alteration before many years, and that the Irish land bill is only the first step in a long series of legislation which may end in what would be, to all intents and purposes, a nationalization of this form of property. It is obvious that the government of a country cannot afford to permit of the depopulation of great areas of land for the purpose of satisfying the whims of its owners. If, for

any reason, the great landed proprietors of England should decide to convert their estates into hunting parks or into grazing lands-a by no means improbable supposition con-sidering the great wealth possessed by those engaged in manufacture or commerce, and their desire to spend a pertion of time in hunting and shooting, and considering also the poor return that strictly agricultural pursuits are now returning to those engaged to them-it would be an easy matter to ferce into the larger cities, or to foreign countries, millions of the inhabitants of Great Britain.


