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read the demise of one of our oldest and most  
 suddenly killed citizens. Mr. J. B. Diblett, who  
 on Saturday last, was taken  
 a short time or so far as he was able to  
 walk up stairs to bed. Soon, however, his  
 breathing became labored, and after lingering  
 until about 4 a. m., on Monday he expired.  
 The deceased was born in 1826 at Diblett  
 near the short distance below the town, in the  
 year 1880, and was consequently at the time of  
 his death in the 82nd year of his age. For some  
 thirty-five years up to the time of his death he  
 filled the position of President of the Charleston  
 County Agricultural Society. In 1886 he was  
 elected to the office of Justice of the Peace, then  
 Governor of the State, and was subsequently  
 General road-collector for this and the up-per  
 districts and to this office was added, in 1888,  
 that of Deputy Treasurer, with an increase of  
 salary and with the condition attached that he  
 should have an office at the Lower Court. These  
 latter offices he continued to occupy until, per-  
 haps, his greatest sorrow, the superannuation of  
 50 years. He was a man generous and outspoken  
 in his impulses, straightforward, of sterling in-  
 tegrity, and his name will long be remembered  
 with respect by those who had the pleasure of  
 his acquaintance. He was a member of the  
 church of the parish rural grade, and followed  
 Wednesday by a large number of sorrowing  
 friends.

The St. John & Maine Railroad, upon the  
 1st of July, will pass into the hands of the  
 N. B. Railway Co., upon a lease with condi-  
 tions of absolute purchase, for 999 years.  
 Hon. Isaac Burpee, as the representative  
 in New Brunswick of the Company will have  
 large additions to the railway, so as to  
 some and to the railway interest, and  
 of the Western New Brunswick, and  
 people the "Grand Southern." While  
 cepting are not unannually disposed to look  
 with jealousy upon monopolies, still the fact  
 must be accepted that, as regards large and  
 weighty undertakings and their successful  
 prosecution, especially such as railroad  
 enterprise is now the order of the day. We  
 anticipate that this latest consolidation will  
 prove to be in the interest of the public,  
 must reasonably tend to a promotion of the  
 convenience and comfort of travel. We are  
 sure that, under Mr. Burpee's direction, as  
 assisted by his experienced brother and the  
 competent staff whose services he can com-  
 mand, the material comfort of travellers  
 in connection with the railroad will be  
 their association or rest will be great, wisdom  
 and moderation, and no regards race, a single  
 consideration of one road can do better  
 the public than of two or more, when there  
 has to be a division of the profits and ad-  
 ditional expenditure.

The present change in management may  
 no doubt, a very large expenditure of money  
 in the Province in connection with a better  
 equipment of the tracks and rolling stock.

Mr. JOHNSON, of the Nova Scotia firm that  
 has secured the contract for completing the  
 Water Works, left for home on Friday even-  
 ing last, after having signed the contract.  
 The work is to be completed by the 1st of  
 December next, and hence, Mr. Johnson  
 they must use speed. His latest contract  
 and explained a plan of  
 pipe service for the whole town, and by  
 provision is made by which almost every  
 house from Captain Duncan's to Dickie's  
 Tannery may be flooded from a hydrant,  
 about every house may secure internal  
 service from a main at no farther distance  
 than the width of the street.

We congratulate the Council upon having  
 we conceive to have been great wisdom  
 deciding to have a new system for the water  
 works, a lump sum. Done by a relief  
 fund, under proper supervision, the

 believe, ultimately less expense than it would  
 had the work been distributed under dif-  
 ferent contracts.

We congratulate the town upon the resolu-  
 tions of the Council in the matter of the
