A superintendent asks for the best plan of interesting a school in the study of the Bible. There must be first a vital principle before there is a plan. Love of God's word is the life principle of all true insight in Bible study, and any plan without this will be as a mere automaton that creakingly goes when the wires are pulled.

There are three qualifications for successful teaching: Holiness, earnestness, tenderness; this holiness must be the clear, practical sanctification of the will through the truth, and not a mere " blessing" to match a theory; the earnestness must be the down-right whole-heartedness, born of vital faith in God; the tenderness must be the patient gentleness, born of unfeigned love.
