

THE MOON INHABITED.—TOWNS, VILLAGES AND CULTIVATED FIELDS CAN BE SEEN.—At the astronomical observatory of Berlin, says a translation from the Deutsche Reichs-zeitung, discovery has lately been made which, without doubt, will cause the greatest sensation not only among the adepts in science, but even among the most learned. Prof. Bondmann, in a paper, has found, without a doubt, that our old friend, the moon, is not a barren planet kindly furnished with light for the living youth and gay companions of our planet, but the abode of living, intelligent beings, for which he is prepared to furnish proofs most convincing.

The question has agitated humanity from time immemorial, and has been the object of the greatest interest. But the opinions have always differed widely, and no two minds have been of the same. Already in ancient times the belief prevailed that the moon was inhabited by some higher organized intelligent beings resembling man, and in order to communicate with them the earthly enthusiasts planted rows of trees several miles in length so as to form the figure of the Pythagorean theorem. The celebrated astronomer Shroder, in the beginning of the present century, fancied that he could detect places on the surface of the moon which periodically grew lighter and darker, and from this fact he derived the conclusion that the phenomenon was the proof of existing vegetation. During the last few decades, however, the idea of life on the moon has been held up to ridicule, and totally rejected by men of learning. But, nevertheless, it has now been proved to be correct.

By accident Dr. Bondmann found that the observations of the moon gave but very an satisfactory results, owing to the intensity of the light power of the moon's atmosphere, which is that strong that it affects the correctness of the observations in a very high degree. He then conceived the idea to make the object glass of the refractor less sensitive to the rays of light, and for that purpose he darkened it with the smoke of camphor. It took months of experimenting before he succeeded in finding the right degree of obscurity of the glass, and when finally found it then with the refractor took a very accurate photo of the moon's surface. This appeared in a sun microscope, which gave the picture a diameter of 55 feet. The revelation was most startling. It perfectly overturned all hitherto entertained ideas of the moon's surface. These level plains which formerly were held to be oceans of water proved to be verdant fields, and what formerly were considered mountains turned out as deserts of sand and oceans of water. Towns and habitations of all kinds were plainly discernible, as well as signs of industry and traffic. The learned professor's studies and observations of old Luna will be repeated every full moon when the sky is clear, and we venture to predict that the time is not far off when we shall know more about the man in the moon than as being an agent in English politics.

He added that Mr. Sankey's complete restoration to health was deemed absolutely impossible, and that his voice, which had so often led thousands of assembled worshippers in the songs of Zion, would probably never be heard again in their service. The great trouble of the great singer's present prostration was so complete that he had been compelled to retire from the work of evangelization, and was only able for his home in the United States, on Saturday. Mr. Sankey will probably return to his health. Mr. Moody will probably prolong his stay, owing to increasing success.

Jesus Arriga, just arrested at Queretaro, is one of the most famous robbers in Mexico, and is noted for daring and skill. He robbed a train on the Vera Cruz railroad once by hanging a hammock beneath a specie car, and being in the floor while the train was in motion. It being night he entered the car and carried off \$15,000 in silver.

A sensation has been caused in Berlin by a public insult to Bismark at a hotel where he was stopping on the way from his summer residence to the city. A crowd of workmen assembled in front of the building and filed the air with shouts of "Down with Bismark," and derisive yells and jeers. The Chancellor, who witnessed the demonstration from a window, was livid with rage. He sent his servants to summon the police and assist them in dispersing the mob, but the Bismark library only increased the tumult. Finally, however, the crowd was dispersed and the party proceeded on their journey.
