After Charlebois death, defendants refused to pay the claim filed with them on the ground that deceased had forfeited his rights to the amount of his insurance by intemperate habits. Hence the present action. In rendering judgment, the Court held that it had been proved by Charlebois' medical attendant and by his widew that after taking out the policy on his life he had become addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors to such an extent as to impair the insurance on his life; that, according to the terms of the contract, it was not necessary that the use of liquors should be proved to be the immediate cause of his death, and that consequently judgment must go in favor of the defendant,
