Mr. Campbell left on Monday morning, to spend a short and well-earned vacation in Nova Scotia.

Miss Cherry, of Seventh Tier, Wakefield, while running in the orchard, on Tuesday, fell and dislocated her left elbow. Dr. Colter set the dislocated limb.

The oyster supper and concert by the Methodist choir, on Tuesday evening, proved really a pleasing affair and the result, financially, was entirely satisfactory. Beside the usual abundance of oysters, ice cream, and other choice eatables the choir sang a couple of pieces in grand style, Miss Cripples at the organ. Messrs. Peters and Davidson rendered two songs with capital effect, Miss Lulu Baird, accompanist, and Mr. A. Letts sang a song, in his usual good style. Miss Elva Harrison, accompanist. At this place, while thanking the audience for their patronage, Mr. Smith, leader of the choir, stated that the pipe organ, to raise funds for the payment of which, was the object of the present entertainment, was being rapidly placed in position in the church, and that of the evening of Thursday of next week the public would be granted the opportunity of listening to the tones of one of the best organs ever manufactured in the Province, at a grand recital then to be held.

An oyster supper and sale of useful articles will be held by the younger members of St. Luke's church congregation, in the Town Hall, on or about November 20th. Further and full notice will be given in due time.

Hon. Wm. Lindsay and A. Lindsay, Esq., of Seventh Tier, left on Monday morning, for the weather during the week has been cold; on Monday night and Tuesday quite a little snow fell.

Mr. H. B. Ramsford shot a racoon, that had found its way into one of the trees in the rear of the city of Fredericton, Wednesday last week.

Two starch factories, involving a heavy loss, both private and public, have been destroyed in Brookwood, by fire, within the past two weeks. They were owned respectively by Johnson & Hunt and Mr. Lovell.

A business meeting of the members of the F. C. B. church was held on Monday evening, which was fully attended. After the transaction of other business, the meeting unanimously decided to extend a call to Rev. C. T. Phillips, to come to Woodstock, and to guarantee him a salary of \$800 a year, \$600 of which was subscribed at the meeting.

A friend who is a farmer, Mr. Jones, located at the mouth of the St. Francis river, who has this season raised 4,000 bushels of potatoes; he estimates that they cost him 11 cents per bushel. As he will have to haul them a long distance to reach the starch factory, where they bring 24 cents, his profits will not be large, but with better facilities for getting to market, under the need for which a fine stretch of country above Edmundston is suffering, the crop mentioned would pay well.

An examination in standard VIII for the superior class was recently held in the advanced department of the Upper Woodstock school in the evening. The examination was presided over by Mr. W. W. McNeil, and was very interesting and took place. After the singing of several songs the school presented Inspector Gausso with an address, the address was by Teacher's Bible (Oxford edition), and a volume of Shakespeare's poems. The books were in respect to binding of the best quality. Mr. Gausso made a touching reply, being sincerely affected at the thought that this was his last inspection of the school, the occasion on which one which will long be remembered by all.

In Stantwood, Quebec, where the Scott Act was previously defeated by a vote of 700 to 941 says, the Act has now been adopted by a majority of 247. In Simcoe, Ontario, the Act has been carried by 1200 majority.

Hartford Items.
Oct. 15, 1884.
The Hartford Agricultural Society held its annual exhibition on Wednesday, Oct. 1st, but as yet not much has appeared in our local papers regarding it. The day being very fine, a very large crowd of people early assembled at the village. The chief exhibits were stock, for vegetables being on the ground. The exhibit of thorough bred stock, including several cows, heifers, calves, and other choice stock, attracted much of the public. B. B. Smith showed a good 1 year Durham calf. A. Nevers, G. B. Burt and E. M. Shaw also showed nice roasters. B. N. Shaw's three-year-old stallion, which took 2nd prize at the Bangor exhibition, took 1st prize here for stallions of that age. Altogether the exhibition was a good one, and the people of Hartford a good deal of interest was manifested and an unusually large vote polled. The result was Wiley 150; Lippitt 75; Tracy 57; Travis 27.

Rev. Geo. Howard, who has resided in Florenceville during the summer, is about removing to Centerville, at which place he is pastor of the Baptist church. His Florenceville friends met at his residence here this evening to pay him a farewell visit.

On Nov. 1st the day which is being at present taught by Mr. C. T. Henry with Miss Minnie Wheeler class room assisted by a graded school with two departments. Miss Sophia Underhill has been employed to take charge of the Primary Department.

Charles W. King and his sister, from Boston, were seriously ill. Mrs. King died on Monday. The annual school meeting was held at the school house on the 13th inst., at which W. W. McNeil presided. The attendance was small. Geo. F. Adger, secretary of the board of trustees, submitted the report of the school. The report was read and the board of trustees, after some discussion, the Auditor's report was objected to as being informal. The Secretary held a meeting on the 14th inst. to collect the taxes and was authorized by the meeting to give all delinquent rate payers ten days notice and then to collect by law. J. N. Gaudin, was voted a salary of \$275 for the coming year, and \$40 for an assistant. John D. Baird was voted an auditor, and an assessment of \$220 was ordered on the district for the year 1885. John Shea, P. H. Hale and J. Dragoon are the present trustees.
