**EASTERN MAINE FAIR.**—General Manager Burpee of the New Brunswick Railway has agreed to grant the same rates over that road on articles for exhibition at the Eastern Maine Fair as the Maine Central and Bangor and Disenquid roads. The Maritime Provinces will be allowed to compete for the premiums offered by the managers of the fair, and it is hoped that a good exhibit from that section of the country will be made. The farmers of the Provinces race in many things. They could make a fine showing in heavy draught horses, and it would have a tendency to turn the attention of our own farmers to breeding this class of horses for which there is always a brisk demand. The pamphlet containing the premium list will be published the first of June. Everything is "booming" and the second annual exhibition of the Eastern Maine Fair will be a big success.—*Essex Commercial*.

A meeting of the students to elect a committee to carry out the usual preparations for the exercises and for general business, was held on the 25th April. The following gentlemen form the committee: Messrs. Taylor, Silver, Moody, Hunt, Simonds, Jr., Murray and Dibblee. The exercises this year are likely to be as enjoyable as those of last year, as the Haydn Quartette Club have kindly promised their services, and with such help we can truly promise success. On the Tuesday before the commencement the Club intend giving a concert in the College Hall. This will be a great treat and will no doubt be well patronized.—*King's College* (Windsor, N. S.) Record.

**A NEW PACING WONDER.**—Glasgow, N. J., May 15.—Wm. Sargeant, one of the first trainers and drivers of St. Julien, has in his charge a pacing wonder. He is a bay gelding named Mac, trained by Joseph Smith of Sugar Land, in this country, and bred by Florida, an Abdallah Clay mare. He is thought to be the fastest pacer in the country. He will be eight years old in June next, stands 15 hands 3 inches high, has flowing mane and tail, and is well proportioned. At a trial last week he is said to have paced over the track here, a quarter of 32 seconds. This is a half-mile track and 32 seconds here is equivalent to 30 or better over a mile track. "Billy" Sargeant is satisfied that he can pace over a better track in 30 seconds, and he believes he can beat any pacer in America. It is his intention to enter him in the grand circuit.

**BELLEVILLE, May 15.**—The *Intelligencer* learns, on excellent authority, that a seat in the House of Commons is to be provided for T. W. Anglin. Mr. Harley, the representative of South Oxford, is to retire—receiving as a consideration for his resignation a situation under the Ontario government. Mr. Anglin is to be returned for South Oxford.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, May 19.**—A great conflagration has taken place at Bel Bazar, a small city in the Province of Angora, Asia Minor. Nearly the entire town was consumed, 150 dwellings, 44 warehouses and shops, eleven mosques, 15 schools, 9 khans, and 146 other buildings were burned. 11 persons perished in the flames. By the destructive fire which occurred recently in Mandaly the great temple of Gaudama was completely destroyed. All the gold leaf stuck on the brass image of the Gaudama Buddha by successive generations of worshippers, and valued at from \$400,000 to \$500,000, has been melted off by the heat. This result of the fire appears to have caused great consternation, being held by the superstitious to be a sure sign of the downfall of the Barmese Empire.

**THE U. S. Postmaster General** has ordered the name of the post office at Danphol, Washington County, Maine, changed to Bismarck. The place is supposed to have taken its name from the man who first settled there. Monday, at Clarinda, La., a young son of Mr. Kinney fell into the river, and his brother, going to his assistance, both were drowned. The father, who was present, in trying to rescue his sons, nearly shared their fate. The news was brought to the city, and among others, it was told to Mrs. Traynor, who was very sick, and who also had two sons out on the river. She became so alarmed that her husband started out to the river, and on his return he found his wife dead from fright.

A thoroughbred Ayrshire cow, owned by Mr. H. Sutherland, Port Hastings, Cape Breton, has yielded 27 quarts of milk per day for the past month since her calving. The same cow yielded 2 1/2 pounds of butter last year, during milking season, besides supplying the family with milk.

Just as we are anticipating luscious feasts of strawberries smothered in cream, comes Prof. Greenough, of Tennessee, with the discovery of a worm in the very heart of the fruit; a worm entirely new to entomological science. It is an eighth of an inch in length, and its body is covered with scales. And yet we must commend the good taste in selecting the strawberry for its brief life.

The effective strength of the British Army on the 1st of January last amounted to 138,222 men, and the total cost of the army for the year ending 31st March 1884 was \$7,588. The number wanted to complete was 7588. The infantry numbered 100,818 effective, and an establishment of 106,630, wanting 5812 to complete.
