She was leaning over a machine at the time, and the suction produced by a shaft revolving several hundred times a minute drew her hair to it and pulled out a quantity before the girl was able to pull herself away. She had a narrow escape from being drawn bodily about the shaft and losing her life.

The project of cutting a ship canal across the Province of Holstein, connecting the North Sea with the Baltic, is now being taken up by the German authorities in earnest. The canal is to run from near the mouth of the Elbe to the harbor of Kiel, Germany's chief naval port on the "Ostsee." It is to be constructed of such dimensions as to permit the largest iron-clads in the German navy steaming from the Baltic to the German Ocean, or vice versa, thus avoiding the necessity of making, as at present, the long voyage round the peninsula of Jutland. Detailed drawings on the subject are to be submitted to the new Reichstag.

There is another chance for a misunderstanding between England and Germany in regard to West African territory. On July 12 the Germans took formal possession of Cameron's river, Upper Guinea and adjoining country. This rouses great dissatisfaction among English traders established there, who think England should have taken the river a year ago. 




