THE BENEFICENCE OF THE POPE.—Rome.
Dec. 29.—Twelve thousand francs were given by his Holiness for 150 hospital beds for the poor. Last year he gave 32,000 francs for the same purpose. At the close of the year of his coronation he distributed 10,000 francs among the poor. He gave 20,000 to relatives of the victims of the earthquake of the 26th of September; he donated another 10,000 to the poor. Besides these, he gives almost weekly thousands and thousands to bishops, to seminaires, to asylums, and to benevolent institutions of all kinds. He has just given away more than King Humbert, and does not spare a penny of the 3,000,000 annually set apart for him in the Italian budget.

A NEW BRUNSWICK INVENTOR.
MESSRS. EDITORS,—"A prophet is not without honor, save in his own country," and an inventor in Canada, unless he is rich (and it is rare circumstance) often has to go over to Uncle Sam's domain. H. Bone, who has been in the world before he had time to hope for any benefit from the toil, perhaps of years, which he can ill afford to lose. York county is at present honored by having the honor of a man who is an inventor as well as a student of the sciences. H. Bone, of New Brunswick, is the inventor of a new manufacture of artificial limbs, lately adopted by Dr Kewick, where he has already produced some of the results of his remarkable genius. Some persons here tried to solve the question of artificial limbs, but they were not successful.

...succeeded to accomplish definite results. Then, being sick for a number of years, he contrived to make a "perpetual calendar," the type of which the work being done by himself, would be made known to the outside frame, will give the day, month, year, etc., forever, by simply turning some hand handles arranged for the purpose.

Progressiveness is another quality of the artificial limb, "an" usually made of steel, with enough cork, inside, to give the shape of the foot, which can be worked by the wearer, with just the same ease as his regular leg. It is so constructed that even the turning of the toe joint is as easy as the turning of the foot. This is all done with springs made by himself and arranged as follows:

"To interfere with any movement which may be desired, the limb is made more flexible than one of the common wood and cork legs, and is said to be superior to any made in Canada or the United States.
