RAILWAY WORKS AT MCADAM. Mr. Thorne, of New York, president, and at McAdam Junction on Monday and inspected the works there, and proceeded thence on a tour of inspection over their entire road.

It may not be amiss in this connection t inform our readers with regard to the nature and extent of the shops at McAdam, which has more than doubled its population and become a comparatively lively place since the works were established there.

being 75 x 125 feet, with a blacksmith shop annexed 24 x 80 feet. In the latter there are four fires, a furnace for making springs, and a steam hammer. The fires and furnice are supplied with blast from one of the Sturevent blowers. In this shop 8 men are constantly employed; attached to the shop are large coal and iron houses. In the machine shop there are at present 19 men at work. Mr Thomas Armstrong, who previously had charge of the machinery in St. Andrews of this and the late N. B. & C. R'y, being mas ter mechanic. The machines and implements used in this shop consist of 8 iron lathes, one being a double driving wheel lathe, in which both wheels, on their axle, are turned at one operation; 2 iron planers; 2 drilling machines, 2 bolt cutters; 1 punching machine; emery wheel grinders; hydraulic press for pressing wheels on to the axles; 1 car wheel borer; wood turning lathe; set of stationary rollers for setting valves of locomotives. This shop and the pit are heated by steam.
