NEW BRUNSWICKERS IN MINNESOTA.-The Brainerd, Minn, correspondent of the Canadian American says: "Major James Whitehead came from New Brunswick in 1857, and was for a long time Indian trader. He went on the first expedition to the Black Hills. As a friend to the Indians he was of great service to the government, and was instrumental in quelling a number of Indian outbreaks. During the massacre of 1862, he was the only white man who dared leave Fort Ripley, and proceed to Mill Lac, where he had a conference with the blood-thirsty savages and succeeded in making peace. A one time he, with some others, was taken captive by the Indians at Leach Lake and was sentenced to be shot. They were taken out to be executed-made to stand in a column facing the deadly rifles of the Indians -when at the last moment the old chief, whom he once befriended, stepped out before him, bared his breast and told them to fire ahead. Holding it in his hand, Majors said:-"This is the curse of the world. It has sent more men to the gallows and penitentiary than all else." He then dashed it on the floor. Laban Stevens, one of the three men who murdered Anderson Larkey for the sake of robbing him of \$105, was executed at Wa .erly, Onio. Charles Clarke, who suffered death at Little Valley, New York, murdered his wife because she refused to live with him on account of his drunken habits. Leonidas Johnson was executed at McDonough, Georgia, for an outrage on Mrs. Cook. The gallows was erected on an eminence that effered to the spectators a full view of the ghastly scene, and wemen, men and children were huddled and packed to enjoy it. Johnson ascended the seaffold firmly and told all to take warn-ing from his fate; said he brought it on himself and forgave the Judge and jury. His last words were:—"I am ready to go; have made my peace with God. May God bless you all!" Two of the five, McKeithen and

Johnson, were colored. At the African Methodist Episcopal General Conference at Baltimore, Friday, a report recommending the bishops to issue a proclamation declaring the union of the African Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada and the British provinces was adopted by a vote of 106 to 5, after a long debate. Bishop Payne, who strenuously opposed it, en-tered his protest against the proceeding. 
