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THE SOUDAN.  
Gen. Graham telegraphs as follows:—  
HABESHA, March 20—3.30 p.m.—We moved our camp at 8.15 o'clock this morning, leaving the Shilluk regiment to guard it. On reaching the first hill, at 8.30 a.m., we found that the enemy had retreated and occupied a higher hill, a mile and a quarter distant. After a short halt the Berk and his men were ordered to clear the hill, the Indian contingent and guards supporting. This was done very effectively, the enemy being driven off the ridge and streaming south toward Tamsi, were charged by the system of the Indian leaders in the bush. The cavalry then retired towards the guards. Many of the enemy fled towards the foot of the hill, west of Habesha. In the valley there were several of the Royal Horse Artillery, while other parties moving toward our right engaged in the distance. The five thousand men on a hill commanding it is being formed. The advanced troops have all returned to this position and will re-take our camp, leaving the 2nd Surrey Regiment with two Krupp guns and four Gardner's and water tanks and several appliances at the entrenched position. Our killed are two officers and two men of the British, and five Sepoys. The wounded are two officers and twenty-six men of the British and Indian forces. The number of rebels is estimated at 4,000. The rebel loss is not known, but is heavy. Engagement lasted five hours. The Arabs carried off their dead and wounded.

SARKIS, March 22.—While detachments of English and Indian cavalry were making a zebra seven miles southwest of Sukin today, they were suddenly surprised by a rush of Arabs, who had been concealed in the dense forest of Habesha. The English formed a square as quickly as possible, but the camels and horses were driven back in confusion on the zebra causing a stampede, and amid clouds of dust the Arabs penetrated the south and west sides of the square. Meanwhile the marines and British regiments, who were on the west side of the square, maintained a continuous fire, holding the enemy at bay, while a charge of cavalry and the fire from the guns of the Habesha zebra checked the onslaught of the Arabs, which at the outset threatened serious disaster to the British.

SARKIS, March 22.—The official estimates place the British killed at 25 and the wounded at 85. Nearly all the casualties were due to spear thrusts in the hand to hand engagements. The Arabs got between the transport train and zebra and speared the men of the transport corps and killed the animals. They fought savagely, refusing to give or take quarter. Gen. McNeil who was commanding the zebra, reports vigorously that there were several thousand rebels in the fight and over 1,000 killed and wounded. Gen. McNeil is blamed for not taking precautions against a surprise.

SARKIS, March 22.—The enemy began an attack at 5 o'clock this morning, but were repulsed and the ground clear by 1 a.m. The day-long drive to transport material yesterday, is immense. The British and artillery were sent to reinforce the Arabs, who were attacked. The whole British force remained in the field during the night. Camels and mules were being brought by the Arabs, and scores of camp followers out of the Arabs are scattered about the whole country, intercepting native fugitives.

The appearance and galls of the Arabs was so sudden the whole assemblage of transport animals mixed with the natives, became panic stricken and fled. The zebra, making resistance hopeless. The scene was indescribable, the Arabs glided and crept in all directions amongst the animals. The Hadendama marched the back like a wedge and attacked the zebra fiercely on all sides. The Soudanese Coolies were mistaken for the enemy and many were killed by their friends. The British regiment and marines stood firm and cool and fired valiantly after volley into the ranks of the enemy. The naval brigade, which was inside of the zebra also opened a hot fire. The Indian troops held their own gallantly as soon as they were able to close the square again. Eventually, being unable to stand the ravaging fire the enemy disappeared as they came.

Gen. McNeil drew in all the force and stood at bay. The hussars brought in the wounded though mangled all the time by the Arab's camel force which watched their movements. The desert is dotted in every direction by runaway animals. The enemy's loss must be heavy. The camp at Sukin was prepared for a renewal of the attack, but is unopposed.

Later official accounts place the losses of the British at yesterday's fight at 1,000, all told. If these figures are correct, the losses of the British exceed those of the enemy less than in any engagement during the past 3 years.

Digna has 25,000 men at Tamsi. General Graham, it is expected, will reach Tamsi and give the Osman battle to morrow. It will be a pitched fight, and probably greater and more decisive than any other waged in the Sudan.

The troops are engaged in dragging bodies of slain from windward to leeward of the zebra. A sickening scene is presented, heaps of corpses of rebel and native camp followers mingled with 500 carcasses of camels. The ground is strewn with rearing iron ridges and spears and shields.
