Another and equally important step re-
quires to be taken. Our public school system
as at present administered not only dissemi-
nates in education on account of sex, but reserves
first-class positions and salaries solely for the
male, thus creating a wide and unalterable
distinction. In order to secure just treatment
to women as teachers, appointments to all posi-
tions in the schools, including that of Principal,
should be held open to merit as tested by
an examination analogous to that estab-
lished by the civil service commission. To
these examinations men and women should
also be admitted as candidates. This dis-
tinction on account of sex is a relic of
barbarism.—*Ex.*

The United States treasury department has
announced the American Express Company to
receive the business of passengers from
Europe upon arrival in New York, to be for-
warded immediately in bond, without exami-
nation to the principal ports of entry in the
United States and Canada, where the duties,
if any, will be assessed.

According to *London Fair*, temperance con-
tinues to make great strides in all classes
London society, and has now reached even to
the Carlton Club. That club is famous for
its cellar of wines and the wiser members are
reputed to have looked in their breasted my

parent value of our trade has not diminished,
it has actually increased."

Mr. R. G. Halburton, a son of the author of
"Sam Slick," who is now on a visit to
Canada, in a letter dated July 6, gives a
dramatic account of the condition of that
country. He says: "I have been spending
the winter in a secluded district of Jamaica,
and have been simply horrified at the truly
pitiable state of the colored people there. Ninety
per cent of the deaths during the
past two years were of poor persons who
sickened, died and were buried without aid,
aid, comfort or attendance of a doctor or a
clergyman, and without poor relief, many of
them dying of actual want. Before I was
here a fortnight I saved the life of a poor
woman and her children who were dying of
starvation, sickness and neglect. Even the
people of Kingston do not know what is the
real condition of the poor blacks here. A
sweeping reform is needed!—*London Times.*

The Widow Rannels, of East Otto, On-
tario County said to a member of her
family one day last week that she had a feeling
upon her that something terrible was
going to happen to her, and she could not
shake it off. Her daughter told her to go
out for a walk and she would feel better.
She went out and walked down the road.
Her husband was waiting for her near the
house, driving it down with a heavy iron-
bound wooden nail. Mrs. Rannels stopped
near him. The nail flew from the handle
just as she stopped, and striking her in the
temple, killed her instantly. She was 64
years old and in excellent health.—*Ottawa Times.*
