Keenest Items

July 2, 1885.

The crops in this section of the country are looking splendidly, especially wheat, of which a large amount has been sown, and unusually promising for this time of the year. Although the season has been cold and backward the prospects for a good crop of hay are excellent.

Under the efficient management of Mr. Frank Barrow, the Shingle Mill at this place is doing good work. Great credit is due this year to the skill and perseverance he has succeeded in getting this Mill to work satisfactorily, after so many repeated failures to accomplish this end. On Saturday, 27th ult., at about 7 p. m., a violent hail storm swept over this place. Many of the hail stones measured from one to one and a half inches in diameter, while some were picked up that measured over two inches in length. At about 9 p. m. this storm was followed by another of rain, thunder and lightning, which lasted for about two hours, and was the heaviest known in these parts for years.

On Dominion Day the children of the day school held a picnic on the beautiful grounds that had been prepared for that purpose, near the School House. It would not doubt have been a very enjoyable affair had it not been for the highly unpropitious condition of the weather. Quite a large number gathered and the universal merriment and hilarity of the different committees had done all in their power to make it a success.

We notice our Free Grants Commission has a sum of money to spend on improving our roads, and we trust he will be able to give them a smoother appearance in a few days.

The teacher for the past week has been very busy.

Our School will close on the 7th inst., at which date a public examination will be held.
