**DIED.**  
(From the Press.)  
At his home, Mount Pleasant, Carleton Place, March 15th, 1885, in the seventy-second year of his age, Rev. G. W. Ozer, founder of the Free Baptist Church in Carleton Place, Brunswick and Maine, leaving a wife and one son, Rev. G. W. Ozer, to mourn their loss, besides a large circle of relatives and friends. The deceased commenced preaching at the age of fifteen years and was ordained to the work of the ministry in the thirtieth year of his age, commencing his pastoral duties in 1850, when he was twenty-four years of age. He was a member of the Free Baptist Conference of New Brunswick and Maine.  
Many that had been led to Christ under his labors, if all the time of his ministry, had been a life of self-denial and sacrifice, but faith in God sustained him. His recollections of deliverance wrought by God in his behalf are certainly wonderful. He was a man of deep faith and faith in Our Lord Jesus Christ, being born again of the Holy Spirit, in his heart and mind, a devoted and true friend for death and the judgment, were among the doctrines which he urged upon the people. And many whose eyes will fall on this short sketch will recall to mind the many instances of the City whose builder and maker is God.

**INDIA AS A FIGHTING POWER.**—If a war in Afghanistan should take place the bulk of the British Army opposing the Russian advance will be formed of native troops. There are 100,000 of these on the regular Indian establishment, and these are the best fighting men of the empire. They are under the orders of the government in India, without a single European being sent from England. All the native troops are offered by England. These troops are in quality from the Madras and Bengal Sepoys to the martial Sikh or the daring Ghorakhs, the fighting qualities of the two latter being equal to anything the world has ever seen. Then the armies of the Native Independent States are generally at the command of England, for they would likely be offered as they have been before, and could, and likely would furnish a contingent for the service. Their armies aggregate 300,000 men, and the population of India is 200,000,000 to recruit from, so that Lord Bessborough's remark that a million soldiers could be easily raised in India is a reasonable one.

From the foregoing figures it is seen that over a million men are under arms already in the service of Great Britain and the Empires of India, with indefinite power of expansion, leaving out the colonial forces of Canada, Australia, the Cape, the West Indies, &c.
