KANSAS CITY LETTER.

Kansas City, Mo,

March 25, 1886 MESSES. EDITORS, -The great railroad etrike on the Gould Southwestern system has al most prostrated the business of all the cities in the Missouri valley that are not reached by other roads. Perhaps some of your readere are not aware of the extent of territory that is tributary to this railroad, and which now is entirely deprived of railroad facilities so far as freight is concerned. The Missouri Pacific R. R. Co., has in its employ about 14,000 men, and of this number about 3,500 are strikers, and so far have prevented the company from moving any freight trains at any of the great centres, St. Louis, Kansas City, or Sedalia. All the railroad employees on this system, or a large majority of them are members of

a secret labor organization, called the Knights

of Labor, and when any member of the or-der is discharged they claim the right to ar-bitrate, as to whether he was discharged for a sufficient cause; if the Company refuse to submit the matter to arbitrators the executive committee order a strike, when all the men quit work, and prevent others from taking their places. This order now numbers in the U. S. and Canada nearly a million members, composed almost wholly of laboring men. The strike on the Mo. Pacific was caused by the discharge of a man named Hall, at Denison, Tex., who was a knight, but now in the hands and under the direction of the U. S. Circuit Court. The assembly of which he was a member ordered a strike, which rapidly extended to the Mo. Pacific and other lines under their control. The officials refuse to treat with the strikers and declare that all men who voluntarily abandoned their service are no longer in their employ, and that their places will be filled as rapidly as possible. The strikers, judging from their conduct since the strike began, will not allow this without a struggle. The eituation is considered serious, and much peculation is indulged in as to the probable course of events during the next few days.

DEEPLY FROZEN GROUND. - Scientific men Every pair warranted to give satisfaction both have been perplexed for many years over the in Material and Workmanship, as well as ease phenomenon of a certain well at Yakutsk, Siberia. A Russian merchant in 1823 began to dig the well, but he gave up the task three years later, when he had dug down thirty feet and was still in solidly freezing thirty feet and was still in solidly freezing soil. Then the Russian Academy of Science dug awey at the well for months, but stopped when it had reached a depth of 382 feet, when the ground was still frozen as hard as a rock. In 1844 the academy had the temperature of the excavation carefully taken at various depths, and from these data it was estimated that the ground was frozen to a depth of 600 feet. Geologists have decided that the frozen valley of the lower Lena is a formation of the glacial period.
