## Parish Conventions.

The annual meeting of the Brighton Parish Sunday School Convention was held in the P. O. B. Church, Windsor, on the 1st inst. The attendance at afternoon and evening sessions was good. The following were elected officers for the ensuing year:—J. T. G. Carr, President; A. A. Belyea, V. P.; C. B. Snow, Secretary-Treasurer; C. J. Connelly, Samuel Foster, Amos W. Hildout, Newton Brown and Charles Brown members of Executive Committee.

In the afternoon session an interesting discussion took place on the question, "Can the Parish of Brighton afford to do without Sunday Schools?" The discussion was participated in by Mr. Ozer, G. L. Holyoke, S. J. Parsons, C. B. Snow, Mr. Hildout, George Elie, M. Matheson and Mr. Estabrooke, who all agreed in the sentiment and emphasized the truth that no Parish could afford to do without Sunday Schools.

At the evening session, after the devotional exercises, S. J. Parsons conducted a Review of the last quarter's lesson; he was followed briefly by G. L. Holyoke. Altogether the convention was a profitable one, and tended to encourage the Sabbath School workers present to go forth to the future prosecution of their important work with renewed energy.

Wilmet Parish S. S. Convention convened in annual session at Lakeville on the 6th inst. After the usual devotional exercises and the formal opening of the session, the Secretary-Treasurer, Colin King, submitted his report, which showed great cause for thankfulness for the blessings bestowed upon the Sabbath School work in the Parish during the year. The Secretary reported one new school organized, at Lower Bloomfield, Joshua Sweet, Superintendent; fourteen schools now in operation, viz: four in Bloomfield; one in Watton; two in Brookville; two in Centreville; one in God Settlement; one in Charlton; one in Williams-town and one in Lakeville. The following officers were elected for current year:—George McIntosh, President; S. E. Briggs, V. P.; I. S. Carvell, Secretary-Treasurer; Colin King, C. A. West, members of Executive Committee.

Mrs. S. E. Briggs gave a deeply interesting lesson to a class of girls, which was highly profitable to all present. S. J. Parsons gave a review of the quarter's lessons.

In the evening there was a large gathering who appeared greatly interested in the discussion of the subject, "Why should Sabbath Schools be maintained?" Those taking part in the discussion were C. A. West, H. T. Hendry, S. J. Parsons, George L. Holyoke, Rev. G. W. Foster and S. E. Briggs. The Convention was a good one, and the result shows that hard and honest work is being done by the S. S. workers of Wilmet.

The Wakefield Parish S. S. Convention held its annual session in the Baptist Church, Jacksonville, on Thursday of last week, John Connolly, president, in the chair. The afternoon session was simply attended. The Secretary, Bro. Alexander, gave a statistical report of the schools in the jurisdiction, after which addresses on general Sabbath School subjects were given by the President and Secretary, and by Rev. B. N. Noble, Colin King, I. S. Carvell and G. L. Holyoke.

At the evening session the attendance was better, but not by any means large. After singing, and prayer offered by Rev. Mr. Thomas, the report of the nominating committee recommending the following list of officers was adopted, and the officers named, on vote, declared elected:—James Good, President; O. N. Plummer, V. P.; Rev. B. N. Noble, Secretary; Richard Alexander and John McCreedy, members of Executive Committee. After a discussion on "Sabbath School Literature," was opened by Jas. W. Foster, and continued by John Connolly, Colin King, I. S. Carvell and Rev. W. B. Thomas. The question was one of practical importance and from its discussion good must come.
